Walking Dogs by Lorna Allen

The first question to ask is 'What is a puppy walker?'. The only reply can be someone who has to be something of a masochist, as why else would you volunteer approximately every 12 months to take on a 6 weeks old puppy!!! However, having said that, you tell yourself that you are doing something worthwhile and promptly forget about the puddles and the destruction of shoes and anything else that a puppy might find essential to chew, or in fact any other of the traits that are inherent to a very young dog. There is also something that says how can I resist a 6 weeks old labrador puppy, as they really are the prettiest of all puppies,

I puppy walked for many years and had a variety of dogs supplied by Guide Dogs; border collies, flat coated retrievers and German shepherds among others. Guide Dogs breed most of the dogs themselves, although they are given some puppies by outside breeders when they have been fully vetted by Guide Dogs.

Puppy walking is quite a time consuming affair, as from 6 weeks old they have to be made aware of the world around them; they are trained to walk on your left hand side leaving the right hand free. They have to learn to cope with all the noises of every day life – vacuum cleaners, washing machines, cars, trains and any sudden noise that might occur when out walking. Some dogs are not happy with enclosed



spaces, like the old red telephone kiosks. One puppy that we had took a particular dislike to them until one day he found a half eaten sausage roll inside, problem solved.

One very important command the dogs are taught right at the very beginning of their training is the word "busy". This encourages them to relieve themselves more or less on command, and hopefully avoid an embarrassing situation when the dog is a working guide dog. People have often said that you must get used to the dogs moving on at 12 months old but no matter how many dogs you have had it still pulls at the heart strings - by and large the dogs themselves get into the supervisor's car with never a backward glance! Not all the dogs make the grade as a guide dog for the blind but they are then offered as other assistance dogs, police dogs or sniffer dogs. In some cases they are offered to the puppy walker and if they decline there is a waiting list for the general public. Latterly I did what is basically bed and breakfast. You have the dogs living with you but they go out daily with a trainer in the final phase of their training before being matched with a blind person. So should you see a man walking around the local towns with a dog on a brown harness (used only in training) you will know that he is in the final stages of training (the dog that is!). In recent months there have been problems with guide dogs being attacked by dogs belonging to the general public; many attacks have been recorded since 2010. Last year 6 were forced to retire due to physical and psychological damage suffered – in fact the dog that we now own was withdrawn for that reason. Apart from the damage to the dog and the expense to Guide Dogs the damage to the blind owner and the effect on their confidence is enormous.

The cost of a guide dog is £50,000, this is in effect from the cradle to the grave. The blind person pays 50p regardless of their financial situation (although they can donate more). The 50p is really a legal requirement so that Guide Dogs as an organisation can intervene should any problem arise. All vet bills and food is also met by the Guide Dog Association. If members of the public on the waiting list take on a withdrawn dog, their home is visited and they have to pay for the dog.



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<u>Grotesques in the Belfry – rediscovered</u> by Anna Piechna



St. John's Church is now the proud possessor of a bell simulator which is a very useful device for teaching learners to ring without annoying the neighbours. During the installation process the bell frame had to be fitted with photo sensors which send data to the simulator. A ringing colleague, Roger Price, and I did this work and noticed that in the later addition to the tower there are two grotesques fitted into alcoves facing the belfry.

In 1738 the tower was raised and it is in this newer part that the figures are housed. The left hand chap looks like a hunky punk and the right hand one a gargoyle. Judging from the triangular anchors at their base they would probably have been mounted on the corners of the tower.

High up on the Perpendicular period church towers of Somerset, almost lost to the eye except for their silhouettes,

are an amazing series of grotesque stone

figures. Carved in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, to ornament corners and break up straight sections of masonry, these figures are known as hunky punks. The name possibly comes from older English usage of the two words hunkers and punchy. Hunky punks are found on many church towers in Somerset, the nearest good example of which is North Cheriton with four splendid carvings on each corner of the tower; others include Muchelney, Langport and Long Sutton. In fact, although very little noticed, high on their tower settings, they are very common in this area.

What was in the minds of the masons when they set about creating these monsters one can only speculate, but they are all pagan style devil figures and certainly



irreligious; doodles in stone after too much cider perhaps, or just a sense of wicked humour? They are mentioned in the last quinquennial inspection report:

1.4 Brief Architectural History

The lower part of the west tower is of medieval date. The upper parts of the tower were rebuilt in the 18th century. Hunky punks and gargoyles from the medieval tower were built into the internal face of the tower walls at belfry level.

There again had I read the excellent "*History of Horsington*" by John Cross, before the "discovery" instead of afterwards, I would have solved the mystery a little quicker.



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Bird Watch by Keith Davies

It is estimated that around half of UK households feed birds in their gardens providing some sixty thousand tonnes of bird food per annum. The practice has become crucial for bird numbers. The main cause of bird mortality is starvation over the winter. Modern farming practices mean that many of our fields are inhospitable to birds particularly in late winter. Even Reed Buntings, which typically forage in flocks in open countryside after



breeding, are now often seen on bird feeders in January and February.

The British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) has been running a weekly Garden BirdWatch survey since 1970 and has a goldmine of data on this topic. This survey has quantified the remarkable comings and goings on the nation's bird feeders. The most notable has been the precipitous decline of the House Sparrow. Other declines

include Starling and Song Thrush and, more recently, Greenfinch and Collared Dove. However many species have increased as garden birds, particularly Goldfinches and Longtailed Tits. The top five garden birds currently are Robin, Blackbird, Blue Tit, Great Tit,

and Chaffinch. The range of food that is on sale is enormous but several apples spread around the ground are very effective in attracting Thrushes, Blackbirds and Woodpeckers. A regular supply of clean water is as important as providing food. Apart from drinking, birds need it for regular bathing and preening. Whilst feeding in winter is crucial the RSPB advises that feeding all year round is beneficial. Food shortages can happen at any time and even when insect life is abundant the easy



availability of seeds for adult birds allows them to devote more energy to feeding their chicks with the insects they need. The advice is not to feed loose peanuts, fat and bread during spring and summer because if these end up with young birds they can prove fatal. Also, peanuts and fat balls are regularly sold in nylon mesh bags, but these bags should not be hung up for birds. They may trap birds' feet. Also birds with a barbed tongue, for example woodpeckers, can become trapped by their beaks. So the peanuts or fat balls should be transferred to appropriate containers.

The BTO survey is centred on weekly recordings of birds in your garden and participants receive a quarterly magazine. From the Rector, Dear Friends, Greetings.

Before I moved to Somerset in 1986 I had a parish in the middle of Doncaster. Many of my neighbours were Pakistani. I became particularly friendly with a chap who lived over the road from us – Abdul. He was a very devout Muslim. I was always struck by his devotion and spiritual discipline. That discipline was especially evident in the Fast of Ramadan. Observant Muslims do not eat or drink from sunrise until sunset.

Fasting was something that I practised as part of my spirituality many years ago – but not for some time now. The church where I worshipped regularly held days of prayer and fasting. Sometimes churches would gather together to spend the day in prayer and fasting. That was on top of doing this as an individual. On a few occasions I remember fasting for several days.It adds a much greater depth and appreciation of the story of Jesus fasting in the Judean wilderness for 40 days.

Stuff I read about fasting back then suggested that an average adult could fast for about 40 days and at the end of it they would be properly starving. Which gives particular force to the comment that at the end of his fast he was famished!

The telephone box is being refurbished thanks to a couple from Templecombe who have a special relationship with defibrillators. Once this is complete the defibrillator will be installed and we will be putting the V.E.T.S (village emergency telephone system) scheme into operation and then, subject to reaching our funding goal, we will be operational.

We are in sight of the implementation of this scheme; I would again like to thank all those who have supported this, either financially or with their time and effort that they have given, without your support this would not happen.

John Sansom is single handedly organising a fund raising event "The Horsington Music and Craft Festival" on the 5th of April in aid of the defibrillator.
