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The 18th Century Naval Frigate In Marine Art by Terry Lee

As a marine artist I am fascinated by English naval history in the period 1700–1815 in particular the frigate engagements. They were capable of staying at sea for long periods whilst engaged in their primary role of policing Britain's foreign colonies, suppressing piracy, protecting British maritime commerce and in turn acting as highly successful commerce raiders in their own right. The ability to endure long periods at sea frequently in the most appalling conditions engendered in the British tar a level of seamanship which was unsurpassed and was to reveal itself in such an epic manner at Cape Trafalgar in 1805.

Frigates frequently confronted the enemy even to the extent of cutting out and capturing vessels lying at anchor. A study of ships logs from the period reveals the extent of these activities. When undertaking a subject as complex as an 18th century naval frigate I select an actual vessel and study the ship's log to find an incident which would make an interesting subject. Hours of research are required before I pick up a brush. To produce a convincing and historically accurate image I have assembled a comprehensive library essential in developing a good knowledge of running and standing rigging, contemporary clothing, correct set of the sails for the conditions shown even down to the correct pennants at the mast head.

The painting on the front cover depicts the British frigates La Nymphe and Triton reconnoitring the Combined Fleet in Brest on the 10th June 1800. British frigates blockaded major French ports throughout the French Revolutionary Wars. In an effort to collect intelligence they often undertook incredible risks. The painting shows one such incident.

The commander of the Triton (Captain John Gore) has ventured under easy sail up to the mouth of La Goulet within close range of the Lion battery on Point du Petit Minou and Cornouaille battery on the southern shore to the right of the entrance. He then sent two officers in an eight oared cutter into Brest harbour with dispatches and a box of cigars for the French Admiral. All the while they were making observations of the combined fleet. They were taken aboard La Furieuse and given 'an indifferent' breakfast while their gifts were taken to the Admiral. The officers were sent back to the Triton with the warning – 'If you send a flag of truce on a bagatelle like that again I will seize the boat.' They nevertheless achieved what they set out to do that is to assess the combined fleet at close quarters.

The painting shows the moment that the cutter and its crew are being recovered by the Triton. La Nymphe, commanded by Captain Percy Fraser, was a classic 18th century 36 gun frigate which was captured from the French in this exact area in 1780. La Nymphe is shown beating out across the L'Iroise on the larboard tack, setting all sail to report back to Lord St. Vincent who was waiting in the Channel with the British Fleet for news of the Combined Fleet. Triton will follow.

FARMING OR FORMING?

From November until March there is not much that can be achieved on the heavy clay soils of the Blackmore Vale and even the strip of Limestone Brash that underlies the settlements of Horsington and South Cheriton is unworkable after heavy rainfall so a farmer's mind may turn to the form-filling that is such an important part of modern land management.

One of the most important is the Single Farm Payment (SFP) that is paid to all farmers in possession of an Agricultural Holding Number and was designed to ensure that all farmers in the European Community would have a basic payment for managing their land in accordance with Directives from the European Commission which, in turn, are supposed to reflect the wishes of the European public. Essentially it is saying that if you, the European public, wish to see land managed in a particular way which will add to the costs of the land manager, you should recompense him through general taxation. So far so good: however in 2004 and 2007 the European member states almost doubled from 15 to 27 and it was decided that the new states would not be eligible for this SFP although their agriculture would be supported by other means. Thus we already have a two tier system which, I suspect, will lead to renewed calls from many Member States, including the UK, to abandon the SFP completely – fine if the value of the farmer's output (the cost of food) rises enough to recompense him. Given the anguished public call across Europe for a reduction in food costs this is a political minefield which will provoke many hours of heated debate.

Another way in which land managers are supported is by the Stewardship system which is designed to look closely at every aspect of land management from hedges and ditches through to the provision of skylark plots in arable fields and wild bird feed in winter. Currently the Entry Level Stewardship (ELS) asks land managers to draw up a map of their land showing the unique items that relate to their particular patch. This will include hedges, ditches, watercourses, stone walls, old buildings, archaeological sites, woodlands and many other items. Each of these is given a standard number of points and the manager is able to use as many of them as he wishes, to arrive at a total number of points that are needed to qualify for the ELS payment for the total area that he manages. It probably sounds more complicated than it is, but it does involve a lot of time and effort to set it up in the first place. Once in place the Agreement lasts for 5 years and payments are made twice a year. At the end of the term Managers are invited to re-apply for whatever new Scheme has come along in the intervening years (and we've had 3 already in 15 years) if they feel it has been worthwhile or simply leave the Scheme. The problem is that once the majority of farmers are in the Scheme the management practices (and consequent costs) required become engrained to the extent that removal of the financial support will not be compensated by a lowering of the higher management standards that the Scheme has already imposed.



<u>St Margaret's Hall</u> by John McDonald

As you walk by the Village Hall you may notice the foundation stone on the wall. It is placed low down and when the sun shines on its face you can read the inscription. On 21st May 1907 Chris Bailward's great grandparents Thomas Henry Methuen and Margaret Eliza laid the stone in the year of their silver wedding. The four letter inscription at the bottom of the stone AMDG is an acronym for the Latin words *Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam* (To the greater glory of God.)



It was through the generosity of the Bailward family that provision was made for the ground and the building of the Edwardian Hall. In 1939 the Hall was vested as a charity. The constitution states that "the Hall should be held upon trust for the purposes of physical and mental recreation and training and social moral and intellectual development through the medium of reading and recreation rooms, library, lectures, classes, recreations and entertainments or otherwise as maybe found expedient for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Horsington." The passing of over three quarters of a century does not diminish the sense of those words.

In 1946 the Hall was enlarged by extending the southern end to include a toilet block with a projection room above. In 1996 Gill Elston, June Wood and later Colin Howell, Chairman of the football club, instituted a programme to increase the capacity of the hall with extensions at either end of the building. With the help of two generous grants from the lottery fund, local government funding, charitable and sports organisations and village fundraising, first the refurbished hall, the new kitchen and toilet (including disabled) facilities were opened in 1999 and subsequently the sports extension with changing rooms in 2002.

The main hall houses a badminton court. There is a movable stage, which can be built in a few minutes and is highly versatile. The hall has a public licence for music and dancing for up to 120 people and can be used until two in the morning any day of the week. The hall is situated between the two villages in a rural position. Noise is rarely a problem for users though in the past the police have warned us off allowing 'raves'. The Hall does not have a drinks licence. A temporary licence (TENS) can be readily obtained.



Presently, we have a number of established users including, arts, upholstery, dance, Pilates, WI and a small toddler group. Our biggest user is the very successful South Cheriton football club. These organisations provide a working income and this is enhanced by at least one fund raising function a year, normally our popular village dinner.

The Hall is established as a charity and is run by a dedicated group of volunteers from the villages of Horsington and South Cheriton who give freely of

their time and expertise to keep the Hall in good working order and financially sound.

Previous chairs of the committee, John Vallins, Gill Elston and Julie Gripper still live in the village and with other committee members past and present provide a wealth of knowledge of the hall.

The committee has a membership of 12 drawn from the parish who act as trustees. Each has an individual responsibility for the smooth running of the hall. The Hall constitution requires a maximum committee of 18 members who should be drawn from the villages and preferably from participants in the usage of the hall. The committee meets four times a year and holds an Annual General Meeting in April. The committee is always looking for, and greatly appreciates help from villagers. We particularly would like to hear from someone with relevant expertise in building surveying who could pass their practised eye over the fabric of the building and, possibly, another who has spent time as a professional fund raiser.

Susan Maltin's sensitive article on Lieutenant Thomas Marriott-Dodington in the November Issue has elicited the following touching comments:

From Kathryn Dodington in Surrey

"I just wanted to say how proud and humble I am that you have chosen to remember my Uncle Tom - thank you so much for taking the time and allowing the space in your Magazine."

Kathryn's Father (the youngest of the eight Dodington children) died in 1994 and she further comments how proud he too would have been to see his oldest brother Tom acknowledged in this way.

From Steve Lee, who (reminding us of the Villager's extended readership) read the Article on Wincanton Windows

"It was with particular interest that I read the article regarding the sad loss of Lt. Thomas Marriott-Dodington during World War One. At this time of year we reflect on the act of remembrance. Thomas is remembered on the local War Memorial, but by tracing his short life we can soon identify other memorials to Thomas which will ensure that his sacrifice, along with so many others, will not be forgotten."

Steve goes on to tell us of his own recent visits to record memorials at Marlborough College and Sandhurst Military Academy – both of which were attended by Thomas. His accompanying photos include evocative pictures of Marlborough College's magnificent Memorial Hall – the names of the many casualties etched into its walls serving to remind future pupils of the sacrifices made by some of their predecessors - and the beautifully bound 'House' Book of Remembrance, containing text and photos in uniform of all former pupils lost in World War One. Equally moving are the photos of the endless lists of the Regimental 'fallen' that fill the pillars inside Sandhurst Chapel and those of the massive Thiepval Memorial in France, where, although his body was never identified, Lieutenant Thomas Dodington is also remembered.
