#### **Broadband Connection**

I live at Feltham's Farm on the Marsh, and here we have download speeds in the afternoon of 0.94Mbs and upload speeds of 0.36Mbs. This is very poor compared with the average actual speed for UK residential fixed line broadband connections which is 22Mbs (Ofcom November 2014).

The good news is that we are in the "Connecting Devon and Somerset Programme" which aims to give 90% of the area superfast speeds of 24Mbs by the end of 2016 and everyone will have 2Mbs. The bad news is that the soonest they will evaluate us and the "cabinet" is Jan – June 2016. The other issue is that the "cabinet" is a box owned by Openreach, a private company, and they will not tell us where the cabinet is because that is "commercially sensitive information".

You can test your internet connection and speed by accessing; www.connectingdevonandsomerset.co.uk/where-when/

There are a number of factors the Programme will take into consideration in deciding whether to install fibre optic superfast broadband. I have learnt that our "cabinet" will not be upgraded if we don't have enough people to justify the cost. Those who are too far away (more than 2Km) from the cabinet will not receive the benefits in any event. So I would like to ask the community three things.

- 1. Can you help us locate the "cabinet"? Nobody knows (or would tell me) what it looks like or whether it's metal or another material. It probably has an Openreach tag on it somewhere. However, once we know where the cabinet is we will be able to tell which houses will be unlikely to receive the benefits of superfast broadband because we are more than 2km away from the cabinet.
- 2. Would you sign a petition to say that the village is super keen to have faster broadband? We can give the signed petition to "Connecting Devon and Somerset". There will be a paper petition to sign in the Church Porch and in the Half Moon pub and also the White Horse. To sign a digital petition please email me at pennynagle@gmail.com and write: "We really want to have superfast broadband here in Horsington Village".
- 3. Would you sign up to your interest in superfast broadband by registering at <a href="https://www.wessexinternet.com/register">www.wessexinternet.com/register</a>? Wessex Internet is a company that installs wifi towers in those areas which are not being supported by the government rollout of superfast broadband. Once they have 80 confirmed expressions of interest they will consider installing their own wifi tower in an area (this is what Charlton Musgrove is doing), and then we can access better broadband from them than we receive at the moment for approximately the same price I am told. This will be a good back up option if we are not part of the Programme OR too far away from "the cabinet".

Thanks for your help and I very much look forward to hearing from you.

#### From the Rector, Greetings.

I have been reading the Century Trilogy by Ken Follett. It traces the history of the 20th century through telling the story of a number of families – from Britain, Germany, the USA, and Russia. It is a way of telling a story that I first met with James Michener and some of his magnificent novels. I am not an academic historian, and find this a good way of engaging with history. Of course, you do have to remember that these are novels. But they do remind us that history is a story, and historians are story tellers.

I am currently about half way through the third volume, which is telling the story of the last part of the 20th century in which I have lived. It places one of the characters by the Lincoln Memorial when Dr Martin Luther King Jr gave his great "I have a dream" speech.

A little while back, for reasons I can't quite remember, I downloaded and listened to the whole of that speech. I was amazed at how stirring it still is, and how relevant. There is not space here to repeat that powerful series of prophetic aspirations – but here is one: "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the colour of their skin but by the content of their character." That has an incredible relevance today – and applies in areas of life other than racial prejudice.

I rejoice in the assertion of Paul in the New Testament: *There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus*. If only the church, if only our world could live to this standard, the history of the 21st Century would be so different from the last one.

#### Vale Trails Mountain Bike Club

Vale Trails is a new social Mountain Bike Club meeting every Saturday at 11am outside the Half Moon pub.

Take the opportunity to explore the beautiful countryside we are lucky enough to live in with rides out to Corton Denham to enjoy the magnificent views from the top of Corton Ridge or out to Stourhead and its miles of fantastic forest trails

The rides will predominantly be on bridleways, forest tracks, and quiet lanes. The rides will vary in length between 20 - 35 miles depending on how much road riding is required to get to the trails. Due to the nature

of the terrain the rides will not be technically challenging however a reasonable level of fitness and a mountain bike is required.

#### **Parish Council Report**

During particularly windy weather last September a large branch fell from the oak tree which stood next to Horsington pond. For safety reasons early in the spring of this year and following a survey a tree surgeon was appointed. The old tree was removed and replaced by a new Holm Oak or Evergreen Oak as it is also known. Its botanical name Quercus ilex refers to its likeness to holly as the young leaves and leaves on the younger branches resemble spiny holly leaves. Male & female catkins are found on the same tree so within a couple of years it will develop acorns. These are smaller and usually more pointed than the typical acorn and mature into a dark-red, brown colour.


These will be images taken in France and Belgium and his talk will share some of the remarkable and moving stories behind them.

#### **An Inspector Calls!**

After a long wait of almost six years, Horsington Church School received an Ofsted inspection early in May. Notice of the inspection (all 18 hours of it) brought some relief, because we were no longer on 'stand-by', but also panic, not because things were left undone but over the worry about two days of intense scrutiny and grilling.

The inspection looked at all aspects of our school and involved sitting in on lessons, looking at school work, school policy, paperwork and data, as well as speaking with teachers, governors, parents and the children. With so much ground to cover, it made for two very long days.

The outcome, however, was very pleasing. The school has again received a grading of 'Good', which is no mean feat. The inspector noted that there are elements of our school provision noted as 'Outstanding', and in fact there is little scope for improvement (which makes the report somewhat repetitive to read).

Behaviour and Safety of Pupils was graded 'Outstanding', key to providing an excellent learning environment. The inspector remarked on how friendly and caring the children are to one another, something that has been at the heart of the school's ethos for many years. Other notable positives were the exciting curriculum provision, how keen the children are to learn and the delight they take in their work and achievements. The report notes the high attainment reached at the end of Key Stage 2, as the children move on to start the next stage of their educational journey.

The nature of Ofsted inspections is always changing, and it's no secret that this is a source of stress for all schools. We recognise that most of those priorities are important and are intended to ensure that all children have access to the best education. At the same time the rate of change can be daunting and the ever-higher bar is not always easy to reach. This all makes the outcome of this report something to be very proud of.

On behalf of all the governors, I would to thank all the staff for their hard work, as this report is a great reflection of their care and dedication. I would also like to thank the families of children at the school for their ongoing support.
