The History of Fireworks

Some sources say that the discovery of fireworks occurred about 2,000 years ago, and other sources place the discovery sometime during the 9th century during the Song dynasty (960-1279). A Chinese monk named Li Tian, who lived near the city of Liu Yang in Hunan Province, is credited with the invention of firecrackers about 1,000 years ago. The Chinese people celebrate the invention of the firecracker every April 18th by offering sacrifices to Li Tian.



The firecrackers, both then and now, are thought to have the power to fend off evil spirits and ghosts that are frightened by the loud bangs of the firecrackers. Firecrackers are used for such purposes today at most events such as births, deaths and birthdays. Chinese New Year is a particularly popular event that is celebrated with firecrackers to usher in the New Year free of the evil spirits. Generally Marco Polo is credited with bringing gunpowder back to Europe in the 13th century, although some accounts credit the Crusaders with bringing the black powder to Europe as they returned from their journeys.

Once in Europe, the black powder was used for military purposes, first in rockets, then in canons and guns. Italians were the first Europeans who used the black powder to manufacture fireworks. Germany was the other European country to emerge as a fireworks leader along with Italy in the 18th century. The English were also fascinated with fireworks. Fireworks became very popular in Great Britain during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. William Shakespeare mentions fireworks in his works, and fireworks were so much enjoyed by the Queen herself that she created the position of "Fire Master of England." King James II was so pleased with the fireworks display that celebrated his coronation that he knighted his Fire Master.

Bonfire night in Great Britain.

In 1605 Guy Fawkes and his fellow conspirators attempted to blow up the Houses of Parliament with 36 barrels of gunpowder in the cellars of Westminster Hall. On November 5th, Fawkes was arrested and Parliament saved. Guy Fawkes would have been hanged, drawn and quartered but he threw himself off the gallows before his executioner was able to cause the planned agonising death. That night is celebrated as Bonfire night by filling the sky with exploding fireworks and by burning an effigy of Guy Fawkes on a bonfire. Fireworks first became available to the public around 1785; these were generally rockets, serpents, wheels and fountains.

Nowadays fireworks are used to celebrate many occasions in all parts of the world. The largest manufacturer of fireworks is China, which produces over 200,000 tons of fireworks each year! The Spanish, Italian and Maltese are generally regarded as the best quality available. In Britain only one manufacturer remains, as opposed to around twenty after WW2.

Since my first experience of fireworks in the 1960s, many rules and regulations have been introduced to improve the safety of consumer fireworks. Many types such as helicopters and jumping jacks have been banned due to their unpredictable flight pattern and many associated injuries. Bangers have also been banned, a sign of the times I suppose. Some may say a good thing, but I have to say I enjoyed many happy days during the build-up to November 5th, with boxes of bangers and the mischief that went with them!

Super Broadband Update

Apparently super fast broadband is accessible now in the centre of Horsington village. Check here for your postcode:

http://www.superfast-openreach.co.uk/where-and-when/default.aspx?pc=ba8

We are told that you have to call the company that provides your internet access (ISP) and they will connect you for a fee of about £35.

For the rest of us who are more than 1km from the box at the bottom of Stowell Lane things are not moving at all and it looks like they won't for at least 18 months (from the website).

We sent a letter to Kim Mears, Managing Director, Infrastructure Delivery, at Openreach on the 5th of October. We have 40 households, (56 names) on the list, Horsington School, nine businesses and four farms asking for super fast broadband.

The main argument is that Openreach should not be considering population density for rollout in rural areas, but rather educational and business needs.

I copied in our local MP David Warburton, our District Councillor Tim Inglefield, Connecting Devon and Somerset, Nicky Bailey, the Federation of Small Businesses contact.

We had immediate responses from Tim Inglefield (via the Horsington Blog) and David Warburton our MP, which was good to see.

Tim Inglefield: "as one of your local District Councillors, you are quite right to complain....We are battling with BT, particularly over the tendering process and in my view their incessant and needless focus on Non Disclosure Agreements, which have slowed down the whole process. SSDC has cash to help smooth this through but really we need to hear some economic sense from BT to really give this process a boost."

David Warburton MP wrote "I absolutely agree with what you say about the importance of considering business and educational need as key criteria in the roll-out – and I'll be attending the debate on rural broadband in Parliament on Monday (12 Oct) to do what I can to keep the pressure on".

So, thank you for your support so far, let's keep the pressure up.

- Please add your name to the petition by emailing me saying "We really want to have superfast broadband here in Horsington Village", send to pennynagle@gmail.com.
- Tell me how your work or educational life would be better with better broadband access.
- We are researching alternative commercial broadband options (Wessex Internet wifitower is one though concerns have been raised about health issues of wifitowers).

Patrick is a member of the Waterloo 200 Committee assisting in the national 200th anniversary commemorations in 2015. He will explain the events of the three days of campaigning leading to the decisive battle at Waterloo, just south of Brussels, bringing peace to Europe following



years of conflict. As the Duke of Wellington, British and Allied Commander in Chief said the result was a "close run thing". The lecture will consider why this was so and how difficult it was to defeat Emperor Napoleon of France considered by many to be the supreme genius of warfare. From the Rector, Greetings.

This is *the* month when we Remember. We have commemorated various anniversaries over recent months: the beginning of WWI; Battle of Britain; VJ Day — even this month the Battle of Waterloo! At our Services of Remembrance we will read the Rolls of Honour, remembering those who died, especially in the two World Wars. Increasingly we remember not only those who died, but those who were injured. And rightly we are now offering greater support to those who live with the consequences of having been involved in conflict in the defence of this nation and its freedom and values. In a debate I was listening to recently it was confidently asserted that the first duty of any government is the defence of its citizens. Who could argue with that? Certainly not me. However, we may have deep disagreements as to how that should be fulfilled.

The debate I was listening to was on *Question Time*, and in response to Jeremy Corbyn's declaration that he would never "push the button." The ultimate defence of our country, it was argued, was the willingness to use nuclear weapons – always as a last resort, but nonetheless the willingness to use them. For myself - and this is a very personal comment - I do not understand people who want to defend me by my being evaporated in a nuclear conflagration. Or, should I be unlucky enough to survive that, to die slowly and horribly as a consequence of nuclear winter. I could do without such defenders

In the meantime, I honour those who sacrificed their lives for my freedom; and pray that our political leaders, national and international, will have the wisdom to enable our world to live in peace.

May the Prince of Peace bless and keep you.


