

2nd Templecombe Scout Group Summer Camp 2015 by Leah Macey


The beginning of August is the traditional time for a scout camp because Lord Baden-Powell held the first camp on Brownsea Island on 1st August 1907. This year 33 members from 2nd Templecombe Scouts, Cubs and leaders packed their rucksacks and headed towards Collard Bridge Scout Campsite near Barnstaple on Saturday 1st August.

When we arrived the sun was shining and everyone set to and pitched the tents looking forward to the week ahead. The camp site was set in a small paddock next to a river in a wooded valley with lots of mature trees to give us shelter from the wind.

Sunday was warm and sunny a great day to play on Woolacombe beach, eat ice creams and swim in the sea... Perfect! The next day the Scout Group explored Lynton and Lynmouth, where we rode on the Lynton and Lynmouth Cliff Railway, had lunch on the beach followed by some rock pooling and then a walk along the river to Watersmeet for a very welcome cream tea.

Then came the rain! And the Beavers! The Beavers are the youngest members of the scout group (6-8 years) and this was the first time they had joined the older sections on camp for a night camping. Eight happy, excited beavers and their leaders arrived at camp and joined in with the scouts and cubs to do tunnelling, orienteering, run an assault course and the highlight of their stay the camp fire. The following day when their parents came to collect them the Beavers were still excited, tired and dirty but proud to be awarded their first nights away badge.

Despite the rain, the group camp continued, everyone was wet and muddy, but that didn't stop us from having fun. We went air rifle shooting, had a go at archery, explored Barnstaple, played wide games against scout groups camping in the neighbouring fields and on our penultimate day the sun returned and we spent the day at the Big Sheep letting our hair down on the carousel, and other similar rides. Sadly Saturday came and we had to strike camp and head home looking forward to our next adventure. Where are we going? Who knows! But for certain next year's camp will be as much fun as this year.

Bird Watch by Keith Davies

Stourhead, the National Trust estate near Mere, is a popular venue for walkers and sightseers seeking out its landscaped gardens, ornamental lake and Palladian mansion. It is also a favourite venue for birdwatchers attracted by its great variety of countryside ranging from pine forest and ancient deciduous woodland, through parkland and chalk downs to farmland. This huge estate, covering over two and a half thousand acres and managed with wildlife in mind, supports a plethora of birdlife.

The woodland is a remnant of the huge Selwood Forest that, in Anglo Saxon times, used to stretch north from Stourhead all the way to the Cotswolds. Much of what remains has been planted with conifers and in these you can find two of our smallest birds, the Firecrest and the Goldcrest. In the depths of the pines lurks the mighty Goshawk, one of our largest birds of prey. It is very difficult to see one of these furtive raptors and the best method is to climb to the top of King Alfred's Tower in early spring and try to catch sight of one displaying above the tree tops. There is also a good number of Common Crossbills whose crossed-bill is adapted for extracting seeds from pine and spruce cones. These are easy to find as they feed noisily in flocks at the top of the tallest trees.

There is an estate booklet containing a number of suggested walks and one of these takes you on a circular route through one of the four working farms on the estate. The farms are in Environmental Stewardship Schemes and thus you can count on seeing many of our typical farmland birds whose numbers are in steep decline elsewhere. These include three species that have been red-listed for conservation purposes. They are Yellowhammer, Skylark and Linnet. There has been a decrease of almost 60% in Linnet numbers since 1970, but they are flourishing in the Stourhead fields as there is an abundance of seeds and insects.

It is easy to extend this walk to include the chalk grassland of White Sheet Hill. This gives superb views over the whole estate and surrounding countryside. It also comes with wildflowers and rare butterflies and the walk back down the hill can include a visit to the welcoming Red Lion Inn which is on an old coaching route and which used to stable the extra horses required to tackle the steep hill.

We take the children across the fields to collect our own body weight in berries – and they were absolutely amazing this year! Oh my, we were totally spoilt for choice. With the gin already waiting, we rush home to start the magic. Last year's batch has now been bottled up and labelled ready to give as Christmas gifts and it is eagerly awaited by those in the know.

My husband is the preserve king in our house and we have been collecting jam jars from neighbours to cope with the amount of produce that we had. Our cupboards and freezer (and those of our neighbours) are bulging with chutneys, jams, pickles, passata, dried chillies, stewed fruits, cakes and just about every other way of being able to enjoy our harvest well into the winter and beyond.

So, what shall I be doing this Saturday evening? Sitting down with my seed catalogue in front of the wood burning stove, the moggy will probably join me and together we shall watch another of my favourite things about Autumn – Strictly Come Dancing! With a glass of last year's sloe gin to hand of course.

The competition was so close that the scorers had to take into account performance on the last six, and then the last 3 holes to decide a winner. There were 7 players contending for the first 3 places with just 3 points between them.

The amount raised for charity was far in excess of previous efforts, helped by the generous donation of raffle and auction prizes by Hunts Foodservice Ltd, the Half Moon, the White Horse, Wincanton Racecourse, Jerry's Electrical and Henstridge Golf Club.

From the Rector, Greetings.

And here we are in the run up to Christmas. How many shopping days are there? Plans are being made, presents bought, cards soon to be sent. Yet there's another side to this time of year with the long winter nights. For so many people this is a time they dread – especially those who are on their own.

For myself, I have always liked the dark nights. That is for one simple reason – you can see the stars. As a young teenager I loved the stars – and borrowed a small telescope from our school as often as I could. Although I am not into star gazing as I was then – I still love a clear dark winter's night when you can lift your head and see the Milky Way across the sky, and Orion and The Plough (or whatever name you want to give it). That young teenager that was me could do his paper round blindfolded because I did it looking up rather than where I was going! Then I would have called myself an atheist – but I couldn't help looking at the stars and wondering, "Are you there, God....?"

As I look at the stars I wonder at the majesty and beauty of the universe; but at the same time it brings home the smallness, and apparent insignificance of humans, and our bit of cosmic dust that is so important to us, the Earth. "When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars what are human beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?" (Psalm 8:3,4).

In pre-Christian days 'longest-night' was approached with fear. As the sun got lower and lower in the sky – what if it disappeared? Sacrifices were offered to appease the gods to persuade them to give us another year. It is no wonder that the early Christians chose this time of year to celebrate the birth of the Son who rises with healing in his wings. The one who brings not fear, but peace and joy.

The Psalm continues: "Yet you have made them a little lower than God, and crowned them with glory and honour..." We see this most fully fulfilled in the one whose birth we celebrate at Christmas. As we place our hand in his hand, he takes our fear and gives us his peace; he takes our darkness and fills us with his light. He gives us eyes and a heart to see and rejoice in the beauty of his world.

May our loving God give you a happy Christmas, and a truly blessed New Year.

The first half term has been exhausting for us all but very enjoyable and we hope the rest of the year is just as busy and exciting!







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
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
