

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#### Violence on Horsington Marsh in 1624 by Susan Maltin

The Court of the Star Chamber operated in London from the late middle ages to the time of the Civil War and recorded violent disputes between people. Horsington, like most villages in England, features in this court.

Violence was recorded on the Marsh in 1624. It all goes back to 1607, when a certain Sir Hugh Smith granted a lease of a cottage and a five acre meadow called Home Close, along with other meadows called Hookes Meadow and Broad More Field, on Horsington Marsh, to George Crosse



of Marnhull, the owner of a pub, and so the Crosse family became involved in the life of Horsington. As well as the cottage and the meadows, the lease gave George Crosse the right to graze 6 oxen and 1 horse on Horsington Common and another 6 oxen and 2 horses on Horwood Common, but interestingly he had no right to the oak, ash or elm trees on the land.

George's daughter Susan married William Browning of South Cadbury on 11<sup>th</sup> November 1616, and in 1622 George Crosse mortgaged the lands on the Marsh to Susan and her husband William Browning for £150. As George Crosse did not pay back the requisite £150, William Browning moved into the cottage and started using the meadows and grazing his cattle.

A couple of years later on 30<sup>h</sup> March 1624 George Crosse and his friend Hud Harris (a rather evil sounding man who wanted to get the lands for himself) tried to get William Browning out of the cottage and off the lands and to reclaim them for George Crosse. William Browning was not cooperative and so George Crosse and Hud Harris gathered up some friends (William and Richard Hulett, John Collins, John Eastman and about 20 other "vagrants, disordered and unknown persons") and they all rushed into William Browning's cottage with swords, daggers, long staves and other weapons, and left William Browning wounded, having taken his cattle.

George Crosse and Hud Harris then tried some clever legal tricks to get William Browning off the land and out of the cottage by letting it out to other people. William Browning did not co-operate and so on 9<sup>th</sup> October 1624 George Crosse and Hud Harris and their gang of thugs once again attacked William Browning intending to break down the windows and doors of the cottage, and again drove his cattle away.

In the court case that ensued in the Court of the Star Chamber, brought by William Browning who wanted to get back into the cottage and land that he believed was rightfully his, Hud Harris argued his side of the story saying that the house had been let to a Richard Hulet and that William Browning had gone in and taken down the door bar and struck Richard Hulet on the head, grievously wounding him.

The court judgement does not survive, so we do not know whether to believe the rather violent Hud Harris or William Browning, but my money is on William Browning who is trying to act honourably with his wife and her rather troublesome father and his gang of thugs. And it was all on Horsington Marsh.

#### Parish Council Report by Angela Clayton

In December our Parish Clerk David Chapman (unfortunately for the Parish Council) decided it was time to move on. David has provided an excellent service and we will miss his knowledge, expertise and patience. So a big thank you.

The Parish Council manage and maintain the children's play area in Horsington. As well as grass cutting and repairs to fencing and play equipment, regular inspections are carried out for insurance purposes. The old netball/ basketball posts had to be removed last year; although fortunately we will be installing new posts very shortly – made possible by generous funding from the Somerset County Council Health and Wellbeing Budget.

Management of the Horse Pond continues, and during the winter months the sluices are lifted. We are in the process of obtaining quotes to remove the substantial amount of silt that has built up, and propose to carry out the dredging works later on in the year. We are also investigating possible funding via grants, charitable organisations, local companies



and individuals. Part of our long term management plan for the Pond is to install natural barriers to minimise silt levels and, with the introduction of new planting, improve the appearance and enhance wild life (see photo).

The Parish Meeting will take place on Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> April in the Village Hall at 7 pm followed by a short Parish Council Meeting.



## Village Hall Heating

As part of the process of upgrading *your* Village Hall during 2015, the Committee wished to improve the heating in the hall.

We researched various methods of heating from ground source through to replacing the boiler. Ideally, we would liked to have had ground source underfloor heating, but this proved prohibitively expensive for our limited budget, as did air source heating. Our boiler engineer tells us that the boiler, although old, is still operating relatively efficiently. Replacing the boiler with up-to-date equipment might improve the efficiency by upwards of 20%, but recouping the cost of a new boiler would take considerable time. Therefore, we decided to install uprated radiators and destratification fans. This system has proven effective in Ditcheat Village Hall where they have achieved savings of approximately 20% in heating costs added to the benefit of having a much improved environment in their hall. This relatively low cost solution allows us the opportunity to recoup the outlay within 3 to 4 years at 2015 prices.

Generally, we have had positive feedback, but there has been some comment about the fans, which might indicate a lack of understanding of the principle behind the fans' operation. Stratification is the single biggest waste of energy in buildings. Radiators are constantly replacing the heat that rises away from the floor area. The fans redistribute (destratify) the already heated air from the unoccupied ceiling space back down to floor level. With our system, the fans are combined with high and low level temperature sensors and a controller that are linked to the heating timer switch. When the heating is switched on the fans operate at a fairly high rate (usually for a couple of minutes) until the air has been disturbed enough for the temperatures at the sensors to have been equalised. The fans then slow down to normal operating speed. Obviously, if the building is cold the air being redistributed is cold, but as the radiators warm up the redistributed air does so as well. A slight wobble caused by an imbalance of the blades as the fans go through the start up cycle has been noted. The whole fan mechanism is suspended on a large hook and attached by a substantial safety cable to the beam above. If the fan becomes detached from the hook, the safety cable is designed to halt a fall.

The Carbon Trust recommends destratification as one of its top three methods to reduce carbon dioxide emissions. The committee felt that we really needed to stop heating half of Somerset. We believe this solution will benefit the users and the finances of the hall in the long-term.

When things happened a long time ago, it can be difficult for people to grasp their importance for 'now'. It happened a 100 years ago – so what?

I am no expert in history, but I have always been interested in it. It's always seemed to me that we as individuals, and communities and nations are the products of our histories. On an individual/ family basis it's one of the things that makes "Who do you think you are?" interesting. But at the same time this is a bit cerebral.

The first time this really hit me emotionally was when I visited the War Cemetery near what was Omaha Beach on D-Day. When I walked around looking at the graves, the names and the ages of the young men who had died on that beach I found very moving. And it hit me hard – that what those men had done, in confronting the Nazi tyranny – giving up their lives – they had given me, and you, the freedoms we sometimes take for granted. History became not only intellectually relevant, but emotionally relevant as well – big time!

And now I picture a man hanging on a cross on a hillside outside a middle eastern city two thousand years ago. And I hear folk say, "So what?" This individual took on a tyrant of such magnitude that it would make Hitler look like a child at kindergarten! He did it on his own – and broke the back of evil. Through this person's death – and resurrection – the Creator God has begun the work of healing the whole of creation and us as individuals. I guess, as on that fateful beach in 1944, the question arises: whose side are we on?


