WINCANTON LIBRARY

Do you know that the Library has something to offer each one of us, whatever our age, needs or interests? Some of you might think that it's all about books, and that those books are mostly old and very seldom renewed. Some even think that the Library in Wincanton had shut down long ago... They would be surprised to notice that the Library is very much alive, is open most days of the weeks for long hours and, despite the cuts, new books are coming in every month covering both children and adults' sections. And not only books but also DVDs and Audio Books. And in case you couldn't find anything you like, then you can easily order from the large catalogue covering all Somerset libraries. Moreover, the Library has a range of events that could attract even non-readers. And some great changes are about to come in June!

Monday mornings 10am-12pm:

Free Computer Courses for beginners. Learn to use a computer and how to surf the web.

Monday Readers Group 3-4pm:

The Library's Reading Group meets on the 2nd Monday each month.

Monday Sewing Group 3-4.30pm:

"Knit and Natter", "Sew and Chat" is taking place every 3rd Monday of the month.

Tuesday mornings at 10.30am:

Baby and Toddler Story & Rhyme Time. This is a very popular event where children from birth to pre-school ages meet weekly during term-time to listen to a story, sing songs and pick up a sticker!

Saturday mornings once a month 10am-12pm:

Free hobby demonstrations. Local people showcase their skills and answer all the questions you might have. Programme available in the library (So far in 2016: Jewellery making in January, Ships and Boats for model railways in February, Quilting in March, Furnishing a doll's house in April. Still to come: Needle made rugs in May, Local butterflies in June).

Over the summer:

The Reading Challenge. Children in Primary age are rewarded with a chart, stickers and a certificate handed in school if they can read at least 6 books over the summer holiday.

It's easy to register to the Library: you just need a proof of address (a driving licence will do). You'll be given straightaway your own card with a password, allowing you to renew, order and reserve books online. Children and adults can take as many as 20 books at one time. From the 7th of June, you'll be able to take and return any book from any library in Somerset AND Dorset.

To order some books, DVDs or Audio Books you can either ask the library staff to do it for you or do it yourself online www.librarieswest.org.uk. You then receive an email, a text or a phone call informing you that your order has arrived (usually within 2 weeks). The service is free for children and costs £1 per item for adults.

So next time you need a travel guide to go on holiday, a craft book to start on a new hobby, some facts books to work on a school project, the last bestseller or a good movie for a relaxing TV night, just pop into your library!

TULIPTASTIC

Since the children have been at school, I have tried to keep Fridays as my 'day off'. No work, no housework (I try to get all that done earlier in the week) and certainly no ironing! It is a day for catching up with friends and family and of course, for gardening. And if I can combine the 2 of those together, then even better! I don't always manage this of course as things inevitably crop up, but it feels very decadent when it all works out.

You can imagine my delight when I spotted that Forde Abbey near Chard were having a Tulip Festival and, even better there was going to be an RHS bulb day on the Friday. I booked tickets straight away (incredible value by the way) and immediately phoned my mother to invite her along. The list of speakers was impressive (including Anna Pavord!) and we learnt so much about growing spring and summer flowering bulbs. There was a 'name the bulb' competition, the setting was fabulous (we sat outside in glorious sunshine) and the cake was scrumptious.



Tulips are probably my most favourite flower (in late summer it will probably switch to the dahlia mind). There are literally hundreds of varieties which with careful planning can be flowering in your garden from March right through to the end of May. And the colours! You can create stunning masterpieces with colour combinations that you perhaps have never thought possible, but whatever you choose, it all seems to work. In my top ten has to be Tulipa Ballerina- it is an orange lily flowered tulip and has the most amazing scent. Team it with deep purple Tulipa Burgundy and you are on to a winner. An unusual match with a dark purple is apricot, or for a bolder approach try it with a white variety. I also love pale pink with lemon yellow although my mother disagrees with me on that one!



I treat these tulips as bedding and because of this, I don't re-use them in the same way the following year. I plant the spent bulbs in my cut flower bed and although they won't be as reliable in the second year, the blooms I do get, I cut and bring into the house for me to coo over every time I walk into the kitchen. Don't plant your bulbs until the weather has turned cold (start of December is not too late) and consider their background – you won't notice pale colours in front of a stone wall for example, whereas bolder colours will give you more of an impact.

Now, I must also speak up for the lesser known species tulips. You know the ones – the shy, shorter and less showy versions in the corner. If we think of the others as annuals, then these are the perennials of the tulip world as they just get better and better as they bulk up year after year. Did you know that all the tulips we know today have been bred from the species tulips? So next time you are thinking about some spring colour in your garden, why not give species tulips a go – my favourites are Tulipa hageri 'Little Beauty' and Tulipa clusiana chrysantha. In my garden these flower before their offspring and are little stunners.

Whichever tulips you plump for, don't forget to place them where they are going to bring a smile to your face every day.

KILVE COURT RESIDENTIAL
