Monthly coach trips

His experiences probably influenced Ted's future life with motor cars.

Arthur Vickers VC

As I am sure you know, I visit the area of the Battle of Loos quite often but it was only recently that I found out that one of our members - Rob Dickenson, great uncle won the Victoria Cross during the first Battle of Loos on 25th September 1915. Rob's uncle, was Arthur Vickers VC. As well as receiving the Victoria Cross Arthur Vickers also was awarded France's highest medal for bravery the Croix De Guerre.

Arthur Vickers joined the regular army in 1902 and served six years with the Royal Warwickshire Regiment after which he worked for the General Electric Company at Witton, Birmingham. A few days after the outbreak of war he rejoined the Regiment's 2nd battalion who had just returned to England from garrison duties at Malta. They then moved to Belgium in October 1914. During the summer of 1915 preparations were being made for a major battle near the coal mining town of Loos and the Royal Warwicks as part of the 22nd Brigade moved from Belgium into France. The Royal Warwicks went into attack at 6.30 a.m. on 25th September opposite a German strongpoint known as Quarry Trench. In the face of terrific fire they reached the German front line only to find as many other units had found that the barbed wire had not been cut by artillery fire. Pte. Arthur Vickers, on his own initiative, and displaying tremendous courage, stood up in broad daylight under heavy fire and cut two gaps in the wire with cutters enabling his comrades to continue their assault. For this act of extreme bravery he was awarded the Victoria Cross.

His gallant action contributed largely to the success of the assault, which resulted in the capture of 60 prisoners and the achievement of the objective. An indication of the severity of the fighting that day is that after the attack the Battalion could only muster 5 officers and 140 men. The rest were either killed, wounded or taken prisoner. Private Vickers received his Victoria Cross from King George V at Buckingham Palace in March 1916. He continued to serve with the Regiment until 1935 when he retired as a Sergeant. After leaving the army he worked for Lucas Ltd, and served in the Home Guard during World War II. He died aged 62 in 1944 and was buried at Witton Cemetery in Birmingham.

Next April a group from Wincanton Royal British Legion will be attending a ceremony near Loos commemorating another Victoria Cross winner - John Cunningham VC and have been promised a tour of the area to include the site of Arthur Vickers epic action. John Cunningham was killed in action in April 1917 in the later fighting around Vimy Ridge which is close to Loos.



The picture on the left shows a view from Quarry Trench and the chalk spoil is from recent excavations of a tunnel complex, which is in an extremely dangerous condition. Nearby was still visible fragments of shells and ordnance in the process of being removed by French army specialists.

It takes place on 24th September in the Memorial Hall at 7.30 p.m. and tickets which are available from Wincanton Sports Centre or on the door cost £5 each. WADS Winter Pantomime this year is The Legend of King Arthur and will be taking place in February, I will put full details in Sandbag when known.

We are most grateful for all the support from WADS and for their generous donation to Wincanton Poppy Appeal.
