[24th March 1796.]

HEREAS the making and maintaining a Navigable Resumble.

Canal for Boats, Barges, and other Veffels, from or near
a Place called Gain's Crefs, within the Parish of Shillingflow Okeford, in the County of Derfet, to join and communicate with the Kennet and Avon Canal, at or near
Widers, in the Parish of Bradford, in the County of
Wiles; and also the Navigable Branch herein-after described, from the
faid intended Canal, will open an easy and convenient Communication
with many considerable manufacturing Towns and Places in the Country

through which the fame are intended to pais, and also with the extensive Collieries near *Mendip*, in the County of *Somerfet*; and will render the Conveyance of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, Coal, Stone, Slate, Flags, Lime, Limestone, Timber, and other Things, less expensive than at present, and will be of great publick Utility; But the fame

Proposed Canal at Horsington

For many decades ideas were put forward to link the Bristol and English Channels by an inland route so as to avoid the dangerous passage around Land's End. After several meetings in Wincanton plans were debated for a canal to run from near Bath to Poole and eventually a Bill was presented to Parliament. This Bill received Royal Assent and became law on 24th March 1796, with the purpose of "making a Navigable Canal from...Gains Cross in the parish of Shillingston Okeford (*sic*) to ...the Kennet and Avon Canal" near Bradford on Avon.

The course of the canal was to run from just east of Bradford on Avon to Frome, Witham Friary, North Brewham and Wincanton. From there it turned south into the valley of the Cale passing east of North Cheriton and to the west of Henstridge and on to Shillingstone.

Not only did the Act include a branch canal from Frome westwards to Edford and Nettlebridge it also specified that the branch canal had to be built before any construction of the main line could begin. Presumably the proprietors expected that the branch would produce enough traffic from the carriage of coal and stone from around Vobster to raise funds for the next phase of the project. But in 1803 money ran out, partly because of the outbreak of the Napoleonic Wars again and with fears of French invasion, so it was decided to halt work to the canal, leaving about ³/₄ mile of the branch canal at the Frome end yet to be dug. The end of the war in 1815 was followed by a recession and slump and it was not until 1825 that trade began to pick up again. But by this time the new-fangled railways were attracting people's interest and several schemes were afoot in the area. A meeting was called at the Wincanton Town Hall to take place on the 24th October to raise more funds to complete the branch canal and extend the canal from Frome to connect up to a railway line. Amongst the names of the gentlemen involved are to be found Messrs. Yeatman, Bailward, Messiter, Mitchell and Dyne. But the railway schemes foundered and money to complete the canal did likewise.

Scant remains of the canal still exist today, all being on the branch from Frome, the most obvious being the aqueduct at Coleford, known locally as "Hucky Duck" and the "Roman Wall" at Frome. Unfortunately, all the records of the Dorset & Somerset Canal were held in the solicitor's office above the Westminster Bank in South Street, Wincanton and were destroyed in May 1944 when an enemy bomb struck the building.

So, playing what if, might we today have had our own marina in Horsington where we could moor our own narrow boats or pleasure cruisers or wander down to the Half Moon or White Horse to exchange boating chatter with visiting crews?

The week has been full of events, each classroom focusing on an author or a book: "Peter Rabbit" for Water Class, "The tiger came to tea" in Air Class, Shakespeare in Fire Class and "Winnie-the-Pooh" in Earth Class. On Monday, the school received the special visit of a local author, Tamsin Cooke. Mrs Cooke, a Primary School teacher, has recently published her first book "Cat Burglar" after more than 12 years persevering in trying to get her books published. She was full of advice to the children on how to follow your dreams and do your best to reach them. Her workshops in Fire and Earth Class were truly inspiring, packed with creative writing ideas.

On Friday afternoon, to close that special week, parents were invited to the Village Hall to attend a short presentation of the activities planned over the week. Reception and Year 1 children in Water Class showed the posters they have made about Mr McGregor's garden and all the vegetables you could find in it, with other drawings of Peter Rabbit and his family; they told what they have learned about the life of Beatrix Potter and how they tasted several types of vegetables by making a yummy soup.

Children in Mr Canning's class (years 1 and 2) recited the story of "The tiger came to tea" with many sounds and actions; they spoke about the incredible life of Judith Kerr and how they ended the week by having a proper tea party in the classroom in a perfect British way!

Years 3 and 4 children in Fire Class focused on Shakespeare as part of their topic on Tudors. Some children acted the first lines of Macbeth in their best witches' voices; parents could hear a selection of very imaginative insults written by the children in Shakespeare's way before listening to the recitation of The Witches potion.


Older children in Earth Class bravely said a long and witty poem by A.A Milne called "The King's Breakfast".

'Tis the season...

...to be jolly? Definitely – Christmas is now within reach and in our house, there is so much joy to be had in the run up to the big day!

...to be thankful? Absolutely – horticulturally (and weather-wise), we have had a fantastic year and a very bountiful harvest. The frosts came late so I was picking my dahlias and tomatoes well into November. We have made extra efforts this year to preserve everything possible, so the larder is full to bursting with tastes of spring, summer and autumn.

...to be out in the garden? Yes! Unless you were super keen at the end of November, there are a few things you need to do. A key winter task is to clear up the fallen leaves from your grass. This is vital as without it, the grass may die off and any small spring bulbs such as snowdrops and winter aconites will fight to show their very welcome heads early next year. Don't throw the leaves away though, either put them directly on to your compost heap, create a leaf pile in a corner of your garden, or if you don't have the luxury of space for either of those, put them directly on to your beds and borders. They will make an excellent mulch over the winter which you can dig into the soil in spring.

You will probably have done it by now, but battening down the hatches is also key at this time of the year. Tender plants need protection, large plants like climbing roses will need a first prune to prevent wind-rock and plants in containers will need lifting off the floor to prevent waterlogging. Pot feet or bricks work just as well.

After all that hard work, pull on your wellies and with a cuppa to keep you warm, simply wander around to stop and take in the winter stars in your garden. In mine this includes the wonderful and heady scented Sarcococca confusa (sweet box). I planted it on the route from the house to the car and it rewards me every time I walk past it at this time of the year. It is such an incredibly easy plant to grow – give it some shade and a little bit of space and it will grow in the most tricky areas of your garden (mine is underneath a yew tree). Its glossy green leaves shine all year round and the fragrant white winter flowers give way to dark black fruits in the spring. It is also fairly slow growing, so it won't take over your garden whilst your back is turned. You could create a little winter garden and combine Sarcococca with Hellebores, snowdrops and Bergenia, or if you have the space, Cornus, Rubus cockburnianus and varieties of Birch are wonderful for their coloured stems in the depths of winter.

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
