Rock and Roll Gossip - from Liela Moss in Horsington

I've been visiting Horsington for 19 years, ever since my Dad and Step-Mum bought the dilapidated wing of an old historic house in the village. My first visit saw me stepping over piles of rubble, navigating great lengths of old pipes and upended floor boards all over the place. It looked like a hell of a lot of work to refurbish, but then I knew they'd do something brilliant with the building, as I'd watched them do just that with some run-down old East London public houses throughout my childhood. However, I still find it pretty astounding to sit here in our kitchen garden, basking in the heat reflected off the neatly restored Ham Stone, surrounded by honeysuckle and herbs, and remember that it was the old toilet block!

Since my Step-Mum passed away in 2013, I have come to stay at the house much more frequently. My Dad found it difficult to be here often without lovely Jean, but in a strange way I wanted to come here to be nearer to her, she had so much input here architecturally and stylistically. During this time of extended stays, I realised I'd lost touch with a profound stillness, the tranquillity of open space and woodlands that I knew in my childhood. I'd been in London since I was 19, in my twenties began frequent travelling to the USA for over a decade and I'd forgotten how healthy I feel in quietude! So I've been staying in the village an awful lot in recent years, and I count myself very lucky to know Ron and Judy Hodges who are such great people to know- they have helped our family for two decades and been blooming marvellous, especially when you need to orientate yourself around the area.

Career is not a word I use much, as I never consider that I might really have one, my adventures have been so varied and inconsistent! I've been a musician, who runs around assisting the family business when I am not in tour cycle. I suppose by now I have earned the right to use the term, as I describe my musical work, which became professional in about 2003. I was in a rock and roll band, which signed a record deal and began touring, at first gradually in the UK and Europe only, but by 2008 we were in New York and Los Angeles every month to start a tour and do the rounds of press and TV. My band, The Duke Spirit, had a tune which a bunch of college radio and indie stations were playing on rotation so we had a couple of good years! Playing the David Letterman and Jay Leno TV shows were very exciting outings for us, and memorable for our hilarious unreadiness for show biz! We were certainly 'winging it', but somehow pulled it off to do more of those kind of things. We have released 5 albums and various E.P.s over the years and I have collaborated with other artists and acts during that time. Also, believe it or not, I sang on a Jerry Lee Lewis session in 2009 – I find that so crazy, I actually forget myself. My band have all enjoyed Horsington visits and a fair few ales in the Half Moon and the White Horse. God knows what we looked like when we all walked in for the first time – skinny jeans and sunglasses...! We've been lucky to chat with Asa at the pub, who had actually seen us play at Glastonbury and knew we weren't just a bunch of loons.

Last summer I presented a month of my own shows on BBC6 Music radio and It was here in Horsington that I walked around the lanes, headphones on, researching old songs and choosing my playlist, whilst stepping around horse manure and watching deer leap through hedges! A great way to do my broadcasting homework. This year I am releasing my own solo album, which was written entirely here in the house. The lyrics and melodies accumulated as the season's changes transmuted one into the other and I have been profoundly affected by the serenity here. It has led into the atmosphere of the work and I feel huge gratitude that I



am able to come down here to work amongst such rural beauty and calmness. There are days when the wind howls down the chimney and the rain lashes against the old window panes – and I find those equally inspiring moments.

Cider Making

Autumn is approaching fast and it will soon be time for cider making. We have been making cider for about five years. We have two big orchards and planted thirty two trees in 2014, twenty four trees in 2015 and this year we planted a further twenty eight trees. The trees are mostly cider apples and eating apples. The trees will take a few years to mature. We source our apples from local people who don't want to use them and their apples are otherwise wasted. Hopefully we will be self-sufficient one day.

Apple Picking

You can use a single variety of apple if you wish but we use a blend of different ones. Before we start making cider we have to set out all of the equipment, thoroughly wash and sterilize it. In October as a family we all go out and collect the apples – more hands the better- as this takes a long time but it's good fun on a sunny day

The following day we process them. They are washed and sorted, making sure no bad ones go in. We crush them up to make a pulp. Barry then collects it, puts in the muslin liner and presses it. The juice falls from the press into a big bucket. Then we pump it over to a 200 litre barrel. This is its final resting place.

The apple residue goes to the local farmer for his cows. The apple juice is delicious straight from the press! We make sure the lid is sealed tightly on the barrel so no air can get in or it will go off and the whole process is ruined. An air lock is inserted on the top of the barrel with water in so that the fermenting cider can bubble away. It takes about a year to ferment. When it's nearly stopped bubbling we rack it off into another barrel as there will be sediment in the bottom. You can add sugar

at this stage if you wish: this will increase the alcoholic strength of the final cider. Leave it to bubble again. When it stops, it's ready to drink: delicious!

Or maybe it's just me....

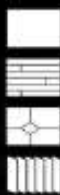
