Bobologism 34

OLIGARCH. That's a funny word, of which we're unfortunately hearing rather a lot these days. Whatever does it mean?

Well, as so often, there are two parts to the word, both coming from the Greek. "OLIGO" means a few, and "ARCH" means a ruler or leader. So an Oligarch is one of a few people who rule or influence leaders in an Oligarchy. Does it make you think of anyone famous? Or infamous?

The "-arch" bit is in common usage. Think of 'Monarch' from Mono- meaning 'one', so we get the One Ruler. Or archbishop or archangel.

All the horrendous news coming out of Ukraine strikes a bit of a chord with me as I've always had quite an interest in Russian history. In 1964 and -65 I had an interesting time as a sort of courier in the old Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. We were in Moscow and Leningrad (now St. Petersburg) of course, and on the first trip I also went to Kiev, or Kyiv. In 1965 I was lucky to go on the Trans-Siberian Railway right across to the Pacific. All this was at the height of the Cold War of course, so it was quite exciting.

From Kiev we went to the then Czechoslovakia, crossing the border at a little town called Cop, pronounced "Chop". My contact in Prague was a chap called George Nossek. With his wife he visited London the next year, was eventually given permission to stay here (that's another interesting story) and ended up working for the BBC Czechoslovakian service, broadcasting in Czech to his homeland. I'm still in regular contact with him and spoke on the phone to him and his wife about Ukraine, last week. On the way home from Prague I was detained for a bit by the East German police in Berlin (another story!). I paid them the money -not a lot- that they were after and was permitted to go through to the West.

45 years later I re-visited St. Petersburg in a very different guise, working on a cruiseship. Another article maybe.

Horsington/South Cheriton seems very peaceful in comparison, but I wouldn't want to live and have worked anywhere else. But I think I speak for all of us when I say that our thoughts and prayers are with the unfortunate people of the Ukraine.

A Life in Family History

I remember looking at the family tree in my grandparents' attic where we slept as children when we went to stay – a rather terrifying experience as there was a tailor's dummy in the corner! I was hooked on the idea of family trees from that moment, and on leaving university decided to work as an apprentice to a succession of well established genealogists to learn about the sources that I would need to look at. This was long before the internet, or even microfilm, featured in any sort of research like this and entailed visits to freezing cold churches to look at the baptism and marriage registers.

My first employer was a Mormon in Edinburgh whose clients needed to trace their families back four generations so that these ancestors could be baptised into the Mormon church. This work was like a factory, we skipped through the work at great speed, did four generations and moved on to the next one. It was made more fun by the fact that my fellow assistant was the daughter of the doctor in Henstridge – I come from Kington Magna and he was our family doctor - but we were now both in Edinburgh! My next employer was also in Edinburgh and he realised that I was soon tiring of the four generation sausage machine, and so introduced me to more interesting records and mainly taught me to read old handwriting. His patience and skill are with me today as I now teach old handwriting classes. Believe me the 16th century has the clearest handwriting, even if the alphabet appears to be quite different. Moving on to my third employer I moved back down south to Exeter where I was introduced to legal records which have become my favourite and the ones I teach and write about the most. My apprenticeship period over, I was asked to take over the business of employer number 2 who was retiring, so moved back to Edinburgh and concentrated on the difficult cases that no one else would take on. My clients were mostly American, and my favourite was the head of Coca Cola in Europe whose family came originally from north west Scotland. When on holiday in Milan I met him to deliver my latest report and was swept up in his drama of a shortage of glass bottles - what can Coca Cola do when there are no bottles? The clients are almost as interesting as the research itself! With a one year waiting list, two full time assistants and students to help in the summer, there was no shortage of work or clients.

After three years in Edinburgh I missed the south and came back and was then based in London for many years where I concentrated more on the legal records that I have come to love. Reading these records is like shining a torch back onto a small moment in a family's history several hundred years ago. Where else would we learn of a landowner puffing with a bright red face and getting angry as he tried to prevent his tenants taking back their cows which he had kidnapped, where else would we hear of people in Horwood just outside Wincanton being prevented from getting to the market or to church as savage dogs were loose on the footpath? And where else would I find a complete inventory of a shop in Kent on the Dover/London road that stocked every sort of spice you have heard of, and many you haven't, along with cambric shirts and fowling pieces, and all in the 1680s?

Ultrafast broadband is coming to South Cheriton soon.

You may have already seen that Wessex Internet has been hard at work building their full fibre network in and around South Cheriton. They have completed their build in Lattiford and North Cheriton and will be connecting residents very soon. They have also recently started work in Stowell.

Wessex Internet is still planning to extend its full fibre network to South Cheriton. They've had approval to use government funding through the UK Gigabit Voucher programme which will help to provide everyone in the area with a completely FREE installation directly to their property. This means that every residence in South Cheriton is eligible to claim a £1500 (inc. VAT) voucher from the government to cover the cost of your installation. Businesses will also be able to claim £3,500 (exc. VAT).

Wessex Internet's planning team has been working to confirm the best route for the fibre network in South Cheriton. This has taken longer than originally anticipated, but has now been finalised. They have had to build considerable 'backbone' network in order to reach the area, and have therefore experienced a small number of delays along the way. However, the route is now confirmed for the first phase of build and this is likely to commence at the end of May.

Anyone in the village who has already applied for a voucher, or registered their interest with Wessex Internet, will hear from the team shortly before the work starts. If you have a voucher that is due to expire, please do not worry as an extension will be applied for and if this is not possible then you may be asked to reapply for your voucher.

While the process of bringing ultrafast broadband to South Cheriton has taken longer than planned, Wessex Internet is pleased that the build will start soon, meaning that they can have you connected and up and running with world class broadband as soon as possible.

Charlton Horethorne & District Gardening Club

Weather patterns are changing. Red "stay-at-home, danger-to-life" alerts like that for Storm Eunice this February are currently so rare that they typically occur only once every three years or so. However, they are expected to become increasingly frequent and damaging in the coming years, as climate change increases the amount of rainfall storms contain and rising sea levels makes flooding more likely.

As a consequence, our perspectives on what a garden should be and what we might like to grow in it will have to change. We now have a clearer idea, thanks to climate science, of what our future weather and climate might be like. This means we can plan for the changes that we will need to introduce in our gardens. But climate change need not be an insurmountable problem for our gardens; it provides opportunities as well as challenges.

This was the topic that our most recent speaker, Professor Geoff Dixon, tackled at the March meeting of the Charlton Horethorne & District Gardening Club. If it is something that interests you, then you might like to read 'Gardening in a Changing Climate' report (2017), which is available as a free download on the RHS website (rhs.org.uk/climate-change).

Future events at the club include a members-only shopping evening at Castle Gardens in April and a talk open to non-members in May from Paula Carnell. Paula was born in Dorset and has spent much of her adult life living in Castle Cary. She is now a Master Beekeeper, managing the bees at The Newt in Somerset. With lots of interesting insights in a life of a bee-keeper, Paula is a living example of how nature can help us to change our behaviour towards life, to make the world a better place. Horsington Parish Council

As the country recovers from the Coronavirus pandemic, normality has also been restored to the Parish Council and it has been good to have been able to meet regularly in person again for the last few months. It's been largely business as usual, although perhaps with a higher than usual number of planning applications as projects delayed by Covid now pick up momentum.

Since our last update in The Villager, our contractors undertook the work to clear the silt trap at the Horsington Wildlife Pond. Whilst the trap continues to perform its function relatively well, it is clear that as a result of the heavy rains last winter that an amount of silt has spilled over into the main pond area. A larger project will be needed in the coming years both to clear the over spilled silt and to modify the silt trap to stop this happening again; this will require significant expenditure and grant funding will need to be obtained.

Sadly, since the last update, the pond has also suffered from contamination from an accidental spillage of heating oil. The Parish Council has been in contact with the environmental contractors dealing with the spillage; we are hopeful that the unsightly remediation measures, intended to prevent further contamination, will be able to be removed before too long.

The Parish Council is incredibly grateful to everyone who helped keep our roads and public areas clear and safe during the recent storms Eunice and Franklin and is helping with the subsequent clear up including at the pond and cemetery. We are all hopeful that we'll soon be able to put those winter storms behind us; it certainly feels like spring is just around the corner. The warmer weather means a return to regular grass cutting and pruning. Parishioners can really help us keep our villages tidy by ensuring that any clippings are properly disposed of in green bins or domestic compost heaps rather than field hedges, ditches or verges. It also helps enormously with the maintenance of the cemetery and churchyard if floral tributes and their containers are removed promptly once they are past their best.

On Thursday 5th May we will see local elections held around the country. Elections for the Parish Council will only be required if the number of nominations received by the deadline has exceeded the seven positions available. If seven or fewer nominations have been received, those candidates will be automatically elected unopposed.

Finally, we are sad to have been informed that our wonderful Clerk, David Chapman, intends to retire later this year. We are therefore keen to hear from any parishioner who may be interested in taking on the role. This paid, part-time position requires great organisational and communication skills, four to six hours per week, and attendance at our Parish Council meetings which currently take place on the second Wednesday evening of each month. No experience is necessary, although a background in finance or administration would be beneficial. If you are interested and would like to find out more, please contact either David or Mark Tucker.
